Green spaces

- Portland features numerous parks and houses one of the largest urban parks in the county, aptly named Forest Park
- The International Test Rose Garden and Japanese Garden, both at Washington Park
- The metro area boasts numerous hiking, running, and biking trails and parks, which include options for tennis, pickleball, frisbee, soccer, among others

Water

- The city borders two rivers, the Willamette River, which runs north-to-south bifurcating the city, and the mighty Columbia River, which feeds into the Pacific Ocean
- Multiple other rivers, are located nearby, including the Sandy, Wilson, and Clackamas. Popular activities include boating, kayaking and SUPing, fishing and swimming
- We are approximately 1.5 hours driving distance to the Pacific Ocean and adorable coastal towns



Athletics



Sports and recreation abound. As a HQ location for Nike, Columbia, Adidas, Under Armor, Keen, and more, we are known as an active city.

- Enjoy skiing, snowboarding, cross-country skiing, snow shoeing, and ice climbing.

 - ❑ Ground Kontrol (an arcade and bar)
 - ❑ Portland Art Museum, Oregon Historical Society, Oregon Museum of Science & Industry
- Concerts and music
 - ❑ Moda Center, Crystal Ballroom, Mississippi Studios, Roseland, Revolution Hall, Zoo Concerts and more
- Drama and performances
 - ❑ Portland's Center for the Arts (Keller, Schnitzer, Winningstad, Newmark, Brunish), The Armory and Artist's Repertory Theater and more
- LGBTQ+ and female-identified friendly spaces and events
 - ❑ Such as Crush (lounge), HotFlash/Inferno (dance), Sports Bra (sports bar), Darcelle's XV Showplace (on the National Register of Historical Places), Portland Pride, and so many more

Getting around

Flying

- Portland International Airport (PDX) is consistently a top-rated airport with national and international service (and a cult Portland carpet following!). Drive time from our clinic is approximately 25 minutes, depending on timing. Our airport makes travel or having visitors convenient.

Other modes of transportation

- We have a light-rail system servicing the Metro area, known as the MAX. A streetcar also runs through inner Portland. The bus system services stops to our clinic, with one stop steps away from our front door.
- Electric bikes, electric scooters, and traditional bikes are also popular methods of transport.
- We won't lie, traffic can be a challenge, especially when crossing the city during rush hour. However, car parking is plentiful and free at our clinic.
